Westfield Lions Club's Poker for Sight: another huge success

First-place winner brings home \$10,000 prize

On April 26 and 27 the Westfield Lions Club held its semi-annual "Poker for Sight" Texas Hold'em tournament at the Hamilton County 4-H Fairgrounds. Approximately 300 players competed for \$25,000 in prize money, including \$10,000 for the winner.

From the three six-hour qualifying sessions, 41 players advanced to compete in the championship round. With about 10 minutes left in the final session, Brian Sprague played the winning hand. This is the second time he has come out on top, after winning our spring 2010 tournament.

The money raised from this event allows the Westfield Lions Club to donate significant amounts of funds to various charities and organizations. Along with this, the Westfield Lions provide scholarships to several Westfield High School seniors, grants to help fund

I was eight years old when a lady at our church approached my mom and I and took a chance – a chance that ended up changing my

She worked for the Easter Seal Society (now Easterseals), which helps disabled individuals in a multi-



tude of ways. She asked if I would consider applying to become the Hamilton County Easter Seal Child. It sounded like a great opportunity for me, and we decided to do it. I was chosen to represent Hamilton County for the Easter Seals that year and went on to become the Indiana State Easter Seal child for two years after that.

I was able to meet other kids who also had a disability, though none just like mine. I was involved in many exciting activities around the state and met some cool people along the way. One of the highlights for me was the relationship I formed with Paul Page, who at the time was the voice of the Indianapolis 500. He was the Indiana Easter Seal Chairman, and we got to collaborate several times on various projects. He always made me laugh, and joking around became our thing. I got to visit the Governor's office on a couple of different occasions to present the first sheet of Easter Seals during those years.

Doing these things gave me a sense of belonging, and a boost of confidence that I desperately needed. At the time, I didn't realize the magnitude of that question that my mom's friend from church asked and how it would shape my life. It sparked a passion for helping others, even at such a young age. I saw it as something I was capable of doing.

More recently, I also served as the Indiana state ambassador for the Muscular Dystrophy Association and then as their National Ambassador for two years following that. Those roles came at a time in my adult life when I really needed that boost of confidence, and reminder that I do have a lot to offer because of the life I have lived. Because of Carolyn S. from church, I ended up serving my county, state and country representing those with disabilities for several years. That's a pretty awesome

Most importantly it was a good reminder for me that we all can help shape other's lives in a positive way. It doesn't have to be a big grand gesture. It could be a word of encouragement, or a suggestion to someone to try something new.





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

The City of Westfield has unveiled its inaugural comprehensive Capital Improvement Plan (CIP). This blueprint underscores city officials' unwavering commitment to prioritizing infrastructure, fostering economic growth, and enriching the lives of residents. It not only outlines tangible projects but also provides a clear vision for the city's future.

The presentation at the April 22 City Council meet-Willis and key city officials, showcased a detailed roadmap for infrastructure projects and community initiatives. They outlined the vision behind the plan, emphasizing the importance of prudent investment in the city's future.

Funding sources have been identified for 26 projects spanning various areas, including 13 road projects, four park projects, three roundabouts, and three trail projects. Also associated with the funded projects are improvements to Cherry Street Bridge, a new re-

Adams, Jackson consider heading off any Westfield plans for annexation

As Hamilton County continues its dramatic population growth, it is inevitable that our towns and cities will expand their city (or town) limits to the point that they reach or intrude on the boundaries of their neigh-

boring communities. Some communities have accepted intrusion

by a neighboring city, but some are not so interested in seeing their territory annexed by a neighbor. Adams and Jackson

Townships are currently considering incorporation with the towns of Sheridan (Adams) and Cicero (Jackson) to head off any possible 'invasion' by Westfield.



It seems that sewer and water township-wide dubbed the Bakers Corner Project, will likely result in major business and housing de-

the U.S. 31 corridor in the northern part of a referendum on this fall's the county. This would include unincorporated territory in Adams and Jackson Townships. (U.S. 31 is the dividing line between the townships.)

The assumption is that Westfield will annex this corridor with its tax paying Fall Creek Townships and development to enhance even a small piece of Delthe city's size and tax base. Westfield has not officially revealed any plans for taking control of the corridor.

Currently, Hamilton Coun- and Adams Township are massive working on the idea of incorporation. A referendum by voters would be needed to make this happen. Jackson has been in discussions with Cicero on the same approach. No agreement velopment along has yet been reached.

> The deadline for getting ballot is Aug. 1. Public notices would be required in advance of the election. There are local examples of a city moving into township territory.

> Noblesville has annexed parts of Wayne and aware Township. These annexations have not resulted in any opposition.

Sheridan mel showed interest in annexing portions of Washington Township. Whether to stop any such move or for other reasons, Westfield took in a substantial area stretching to the Boone County line which had the effect of sealing its southern boundary at township line between Clay and Washington.

> Carmel worked for years to annex all of surrounding Clay Township, and finally succeeded when unincorporated Home Place gave up a decade-long court battle opposing annexation.

Stephenson House Michael Levine


Accuracy is the name of the game for local artist Michael Levine. His May exhibit in the Stephenson Gallery showcases Flowers and Still Life painting and pastels in his favored Realism style. His work strives to portray tangible objects, whether it be flowers, fruits, vessels, or something else

that catches the eye. Levine began creating as a child. He fondly recounts his aunt introducing him to paper mâché and India ink projects. His artistic endeavors momentarily lulled while in college, but once he reached medical school he found himself pulled to drawing. He began painting in his twenties and hasn't stopped for 40 years. Painting went from a casual hobby to something more when a room at home was renovated to be his official studio space over two decades ago.

Though Levine has never had any formal art training, he has recently enjoyed practicing through classes and workshops. He notes that online learning opportunities have grown in the post-COVID world. In addition to these lessons, he also keeps up with weekly Open Studio Nights at the Hamilton County Artists' Association's Birdie Gallery, Gerard Studio at the Stutz, and Indianapolis Figure Guild.

Still lifes have been a longtime interest of Levine's. He's able to flexic lighting. He paints in stages; usually two to four hours for the first session, the same for the next, then he'll put the painting away for a month. When he brings it back out, he might go and "change about 80 percent of it." The most important part at this stage is to build values and mass the shadows to create a cohesive image. In his words, to ensure "all the parts are all talking to each other."



Just after 6 a.m. Wednesday, Beech Grove police officers responded to a request for a welfare check at the Willow Glen South Apartment Complex. Information was received by dispatchers about a child custody dispute and threats of violence.

When officers arrived, they encountered a male, Joshua Richard, 26, Noblesville, who was armed with a knife in the parking lot, and who officers believed was the target of their call. As Richard aggressively approached the officers, they attempted several de-escalation techniques, including backing away for a significant distance while attempting communications with Richard.

Richard ignored officers' requests to drop the knife and

the officers were physically engaged by Richard, who used the knife to cut one officer, Lt. Jeff Bruner, in the face. Lt. Bruner then shot Richard.



My objectives:

1. Maximize return on investments with minimal risk:

Hamilton County's rate of return was 3.95% in 2023 and 0.99% in 2022 compared to 5.30% and 1.48% for the State of Indiana's Investment fund (www. TrustINdiana.in.gov). Matching the state fund would have resulted in an additional \$8.7 million in investment income



over 2 years. 2. Adopt benchmarks to evaluate investment perfor-

Currently, there is no stated benchmark for investment returns. I will adopt the US Treasury three-month Bill ETF (TBIL) and the "Trust Indiana" fund as our benchmarks to properly evaluate performance.

3. Increase transparency in investments:

Currently, there is no data on invested funds on the Treasurer's web page. I will post investment returns and investment composition every quarter.

4. Increase adoption rates for E-billing of property tax statements:

The Treasurer mailed 125,000 paper copies of property tax bills in 2023. E-billing has been available for 12 years but I do not believe it has been communicated effectively. I believe we can save over \$50,000 a year by reducing paper statements.

I am a lifelong investor and a fiscal conservative with over 30 years' service to Hamilton County. I am a 1989 graduate of Taylor University.
