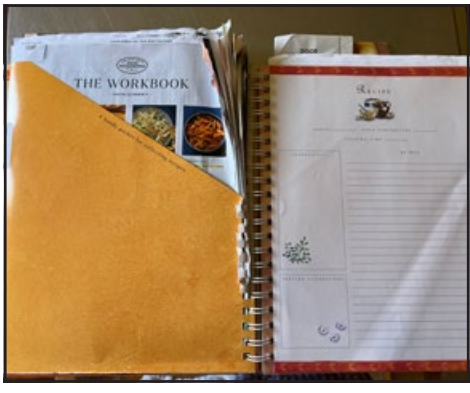

and Posts Veteran Service Officers together at each post to setup VA Claims Filing Days and we will be setting up suicide prevention training at all our Posts as well.

- A Healthier Hamilton County: Systems of Care and head of the Stronger Veterans Stronger Communities Coalition has received a grant from the IDVA for the Governor’s Challenge on the prevention of Veteran suicide. We are working to locate our Veterans, introduce them and their neighbors to the benefits and resources they need so they will be connected, talk about lethal means safety, and how our Posts can help in this mission of saving lives.
- Hamilton County Council on Alcohol and Other Drugs is working to acquire mental health assistance that will be free for our MVC and how our VFW and American Legion Posts can assist in designing this tool.
- Hero Hut brings together a diverse group of like-minded organizations where Veterans can learn about services and opportunities available to them. They are eager to work with the Posts in opening their doors to the community.
- Indy Warrior Partnership is connecting the resources to the people who need them.
- VA Roudebush Hospital, which explained the importance of getting into the VA system and filing your claims. The VA today is open and ready to serve their Veteran community and help make a difference in their tomorrows.
- Hamilton County Veteran Service Officer Tom Logan and his team are ready to serve our community and care for our Veterans.
- Good Samaritan Network of Hamilton County,

which always needs our assistance and volunteers to care for all of Hamilton County residents. They are always there 24/7 caring for those in need.

- VFW & American Legion Posts shared their needs and ideas on what has worked and not worked in gaining members and getting the public into their Posts.

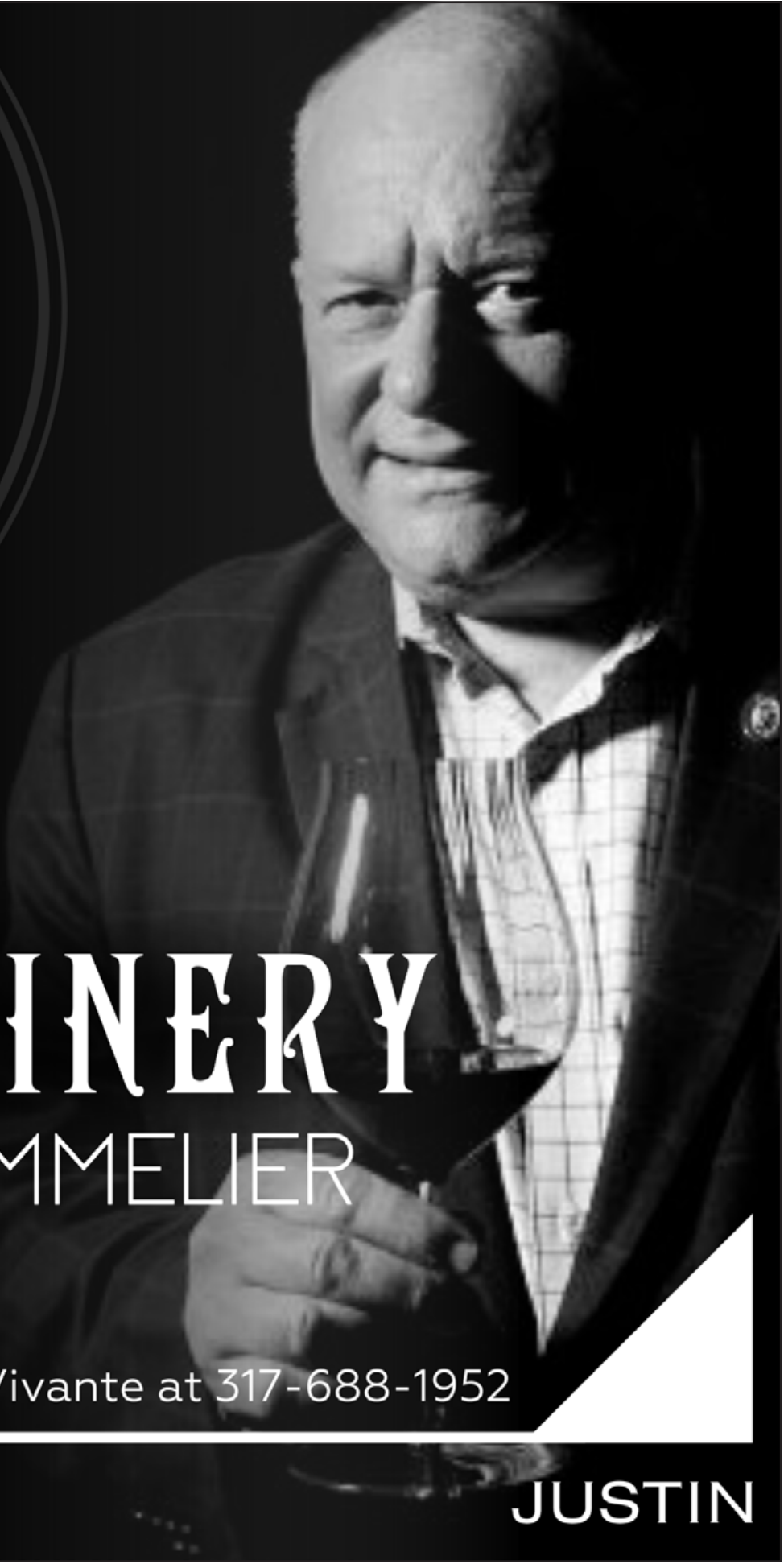

More than 70 Westfield residents currently receive meals from CICOA, whether through home-delivered meals or by attending a neighborhood meal site. Older adults often struggle with chronic illness, disability, feeling vulnerable and isolated, or experiencing a crisis. Those facing food insecurity often face the harsh reality of making complex financial decisions, choosing between food and housing, utilities, transportation, or medical care (Feeding America). CICOA’s efforts to meet basic needs make it possible for older adults and people of any age with dis-

abilities to remain in their homes as long as possible.

The Westfield Youth Assistance Program (WYAP) was formed in 2009 as an early intervention advocate for youth ages 3 to 17 facing challenging life circumstances. This year’s speakers include Audra Ames, an Ongoing Grief Support Group facilitator and Brooke’s Place donor, and Clare Wright, a current Brooke’s Place Kid. They will speak to guests about their grief journeys and experiences

“In February 2021 my husband Scot tragically died in a military aviation training accident,” Ames said. “Scot was the absolute best of us – selfless, driven, vibrant, kindhearted, and humble.”

She says she believes in the importance of sharing her grief journey and finding her purpose within her pain. She emphasizes service and uplifting others. 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Indiana native living in Tampa area describes weathering Milton & Helene

Indiana native **Marcie Muensterman** and her family weathered Hurricane Helene two weeks ago. Then, they hoped to make it safely through **Hurricane Milton**, just miles from Tampa.

Longtime Carmel resident Muensterman lives with her family in the **Wesley Chapel** area. That’s about 25 miles off the western coast of Florida. Their home does not sit in an evacuation zone, but is about 15 miles northwest of the last evacuation zone in the area.

Muensterman says areas up to 10 miles inland have been evacuated, which is more than what is typically told to evacuate when tornadoes uncommonly hit the area.

“It has not been hit in 103 years with a direct impact storm,” Muensterman said. “It is considered, typically, to be a better area of Florida to live in, which is one of the reasons we chose it, to be honest. I think the fear is that this is the big

one, and as far as what we know about it, it does seem like it’s going to be a catastrophic storm. I’m getting goosebumps because it makes me so anxious.”

Because they are not too far from the coast, but not in an evacuation zone, they have offered up their home to anyone that needs shelter.

They currently have two women staying with them during the storm. Their guests have been in Florida for 40 years and evacuated for only one other storm.

“They didn’t have anywhere to go,” Muensterman said. “The shelters get very full. They don’t always take animals, there’s a lot of things, a lot of dynamics with evacuation.”

The Muensterman family is taking precautions to ensure they all are safe. By saving water in their bathtub, prepping their generator, and moving furniture, they are hopeful they will have what they need when their power goes out.

“It is like watching a turtle just slowly come towards you that’s gonna hurt you, you just wait,” Muenster-

man said. “Unfortunately, the debris and the piles of things.” That debris is left over

from Hurricane Helene, which hit just two weeks ago. News 8 spoke with Muensterman as she rode out the storm from Cancun, hoping her Anna Maria Island home was safe.

“We have a home on Anna Maria Island, which got decimated during Helene,” Muensterman said. “Helene ended up being so much worse than anyone ever, ever anticipated with it going up the coast, and to

North Carolina, Tennessee, parts of Kentucky, and Indiana.”

Muensterman says that despite double hurricanes hitting her community, the people of Florida continue to band together for good.

Richmond girls volleyball team calls for equity in girls sports, hires respected Noblesville law firm CCHA

A member of the Richmond High School volleyball team is calling out the district’s treatment of girls sports. Junior Katie Mathena told the Richmond Community School Board Wednesday about an incident on Sept. 24 when her team **was prevented from practicing** at the gym.

The team arrived at the gym at its allotted time only to find the boys basketball team practicing in its space. Girls volleyball coach Darryl Morgan confronted the boys basketball coach about the conflict.

“Our assistant athletic director pulled us all out of the gym, it was mostly varsity, and she told us that it didn’t matter that we were in season, that the boys were in the gym and we needed to leave,” Mathena said.

Her teammates never had the chance to practice that afternoon. On Sept. 27, the district put Morgan on administrative leave.

In a statement posted on its website, Richmond Community Schools said, “RCS encourages our entire community to remain objective and not arrive at conclusions until our investigation is complete. Our goal is to diligently review the incident and limit further disruptions for the remainder of the volleyball season.”

In Wednesday’s meeting the board voted unanimously to hire a Noblesville firm **Church, Church, Hittle & Antrim** to conduct a Title IX audit at Richmond High School. **Title IX** is a federal law passed in 1972 that ensures girls and women have equal access to scholastic and collegiate sports.

According to board documents, the audit will cost \$19,000.

The audit will focus on the number and length of practice opportunities, uniforms, the quality, and availability of locker rooms and facilities provided for competitive events.

In its statement, the Richmond Community School Board said it has not received an official Title IX complaint, and it had been planning to conduct this audit for several months.

Mathena, who also plays soccer and runs track, said this isn’t the first bad experience she’s had in the athletic department. There weren’t enough jerseys for her track team.

“They gave us cross country jerseys because they wouldn’t give us money to get new jerseys,” said Mathena.

Board members declined to speak with News 8 on camera about the issue.

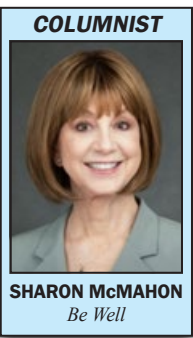

Stress? YES! Let’s have less

“The world we have created today is a product of our thinking; it cannot be changed without changing our thinking.” – commonly attributed to Albert Einstein



Show of hands, please ... Aren’t we all so very wearied by the political rhetoric and the potential maiming or worse that has been attempted toward high-profile political individuals in our country and contemplating how different is the world now compared to that in which many of us grew up? How these headlines relate to our health and well-being (my usual topics) can be summed up in one word: STRESS!

It is a word familiar to many of us – job stress, health issues stress, family stress, traffic stress (!) and on and on. These are what we would consider our “ordinary” stressors. However, the worldwide atrocious acts invade our private worlds as well as natural disasters which have impacted so many. With 24-hour news cycles on cable news, radio, and the internet, these horrible acts are with us constantly. I certainly do not have the skill or ability to even guess why these atrocities are taking place; nor why our leaders and those who wish to be our leaders cannot display

some level of civil discourse along the way.

Merriam-Webster dictionary gives us one definition of mental stress as “something that causes strong feelings of worry or anxiety.” That worry and anxiety can be linked to causing both physical and emotional issues for many people, including those who do not routinely watch/listen/read about these world and national tragedies and occurrences. This stress can lead to sleeplessness, poor digestion, exhaustion, chest pain, fatigue, overeating (or not eating) and even illness.¹

Effects of this stress can be insidious. We may not necessarily “feel” stressed but be affected by it just the same. The news of violence and the constant ill-advised rhetoric that our children are exposed to will, in my opinion, have long-lasting effects on their lives. It is impossible to completely protect young people; however, it is important for parents to have discussions with their children, answer their questions, and make them feel as safe as possible.

Can we choose to turn off/turn away from the news and alleviate the resulting stress? To a point, yes. But unless you are planning to live in a cave underground

you will be exposed to the news cycle and its effects.

However, you can limit as much as possible by not tuning in to the media reports and the chatter associated with all those reports. You can increase your exercise, get outside (pulling weeds is great for stress!) and surround yourself with as much peace as possible.

Read ... a book! Drink ... a cup of tea! Watch ... a funny movie! Deep breathing can also help you deal with anxiety. One of my favorite pastimes I find works wonders ... pet a dog! (Possibly a cat as well, on their terms of course!) My dogs always love to be brushed and petted and they really could not care less about bad news!

If you are a “news junkie” perhaps you can try limiting your time and incorporate some of the lifestyle change suggestions noted

above as well as limiting the time spent on social media.

A nutritious diet, increased exercise, and focus on relaxation can help us deal with the stress, but unfortunately we seem to be living in a world today that few of us understand or have experienced in our lifetimes.

I hope we can change our thinking, focus on how much we have in common as human beings and look out for each other.

Caravan Classes will

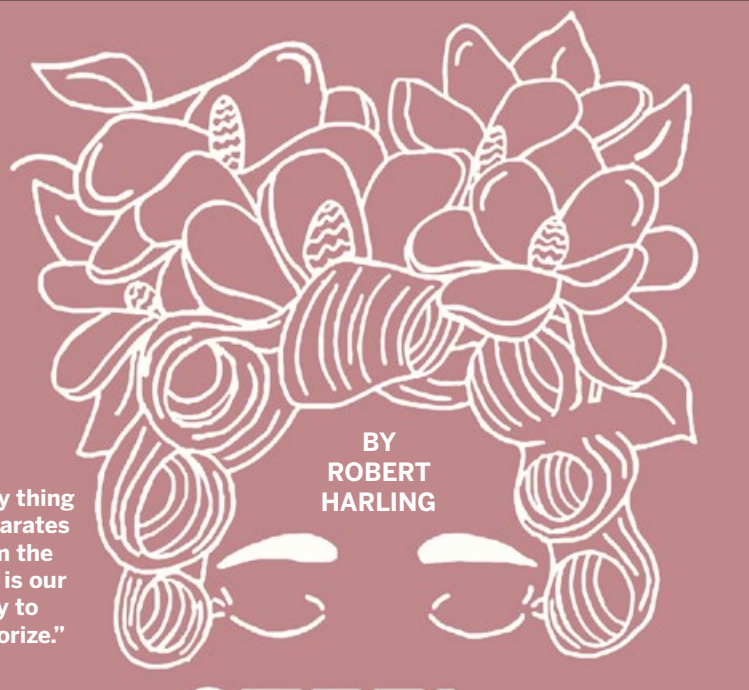
be offering a painting activity. Owner Deanna Leonard says it’s exciting to be included in the inaugural crawl.

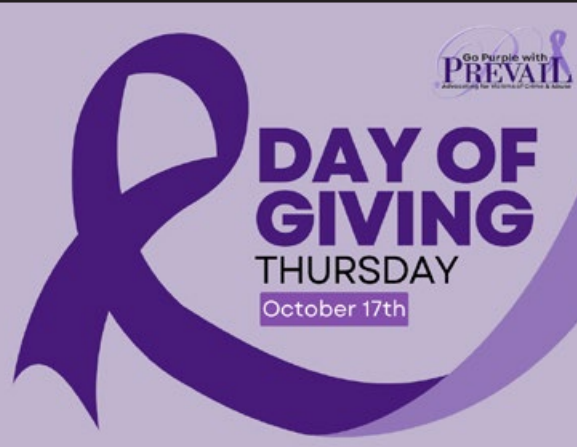

A little olive oil each day might keep the heart attack at bay

I'm always creating or re-vamping recipes for a healthier diet. So I switched to olive oil in my spanakopita instead of butter.

Researchers found that by eating at least half a tablespoon of olive oil daily you are less likely to develop heart disease, Alzheimer's, and cancer.

Here's my spanakopita:

1. Bake three bags of

fresh spinach in olive oil, covered in foil, for 45 minutes at 350 degrees.

2. Cut through the spinach and squeeze out the juice.

3. In a bowl, mix the spinach with three eggs and 3/4 pound of feta. Feta should be rinsed, patted dry, and crumbled.

4. One-pound package of phyllo dough, divide in half (1/2 for top; 1/2 for bottom)
5. Layer half of the bot-

tom portion on pan, drizzle olive oil, and spread with brush. Then layer the other half.

6. Spread the spinach mix

7. Then repeat the layering process with the other half of the phyllo

8. Drizzle olive oil over the top and spread with brush.

9. Bake at 350 degrees for one hour. (Cover with foil for the last 10 minutes.)

Home improvements:

Dishonest concrete company deconstructed by AG Rokita for ripping off Hoosier consumers

Indiana Attorney General Todd Rokita has taken down another group of businesses engaged in shady practices that violate the standards that Hoosier consumers have a right to expect.

This time, it's a home-improvement contractor who allegedly tried running off with hundreds of thousands of dollars collected from hard-working homeowners without providing the anticipated services.

“Here in Indiana, we won't tolerate businesses that collect payment and then fail to do the work they promised,” AG Rokita said. “We will always work to hold accountable businesses that violate the trust placed in them by hard-working Hoosiers.”

AG Rokita and his Consumer Protection team won a combination judgment of both civil penalties and restitution totaling

\$341,006.81 on behalf of numerous Hoosiers duped by Quest Concrete LLC and Cobraro & Company LLC – doing business as Quest Exteriors. These are an intertwining network of “home improvement” contractors that allegedly improved nothing but the businesses' own financial situations.

AG Rokita also secured a permanent injunction that bans from the construction industry Michael Gossett, the head of both LLCs, and all primary affiliates – including agents, representatives, employees, and successors involved with ripping off Hoosier consumers.

Rokita commends Deputy Attorney General Tamara Weaver for her hard work in removing Quest Concrete and their affiliates from the Indiana marketplace and for helping to win the **nearly \$350,000 restitution order** from the court.

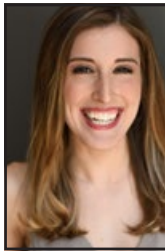

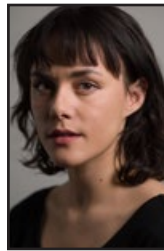

industry for our state and local economies. That’s why I’ll continue to stand up for farmers and ensure Hamilton County’s agricultural communities have the support and resources they need to thrive.”

In the state Senate, Baldwin has supported efforts to strengthen rural Indiana, agriculture and agribusiness.

Those efforts include requiring minimum broadband speeds and the deployment of broadband to underserved rural areas, enabling tax abatements for new farm equipment and agricultural improvements, enhancing Purdue Extension, increasing public health and career and technical education funding, and banning foreign adversaries from purchasing agricultural land.

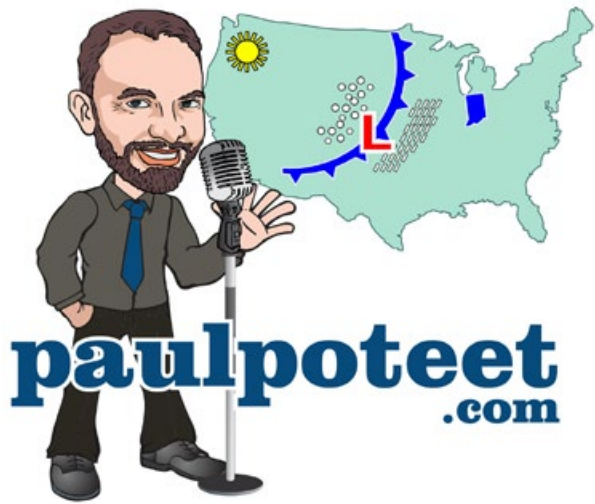

Ramped-up Royals show up big on Senior Night

FISHERS – It was Senior Night, it was the regular-season finale, and the Hamilton Southeastern volleyball team had a share of the Hoosier Crossroads Conference championship in its grasp.

You bet the Royals were fired up to play on Thursday.

Southeastern came out blasting in its final home match of the season, beating Franklin Central 25-12, 25-18, 25-15. With the victory, the Royals will share the HCC crown with Avon, as both teams finished 6-1 in the conference this season.

“Tonight was important for a lot of reasons,” said HSE coach Jason Young. “One, Senior Night, but two, the win tonight made sure we were able to secure part of the conference championship, which is a big deal.”

The two-time defending Class 4A state champion Royals were overwhelming in the first set, skipping out to a 16-3 lead. Maye McConnell served a streak of nine straight points, including three aces. Lindsey Mangelson hit three kills and two aces, with Kaylyn Christy punching down a pair of kills as well.

The Flashes got themselves together and went on a run to cut Southeastern’s

lead to 17-10, but the Royals took over after that and won eight of the next 10 points. Mangelson ended the set with another kill.

Franklin Central put up some resistance in the second set, at one point leading 14-11. HSE blitzed back at that point, taking 14 of the next 18 points to win the set. Mangelson and Madison Miles both spiked a pair of kills, and Ava Hunter served an ace on set point.

With a 2-0 set lead, the Royals steadily built a lead in the third set. Mangelson let it rip during the early part of the set with four kills and an ace. Then it was Miles’ turn to hit four kills, dominating the middle part of the set. She finished the match with 12 kills.

“She had a great off-season,” Young said of Miles, an Illinois commit. “I just think she’s hitting at a higher level. I think she’s hitting with more power. I think she has more shots now. She’s been a dominant player for us and it’s been nice to have that 1-2 punch for us on the outside, kind of like we did last year with (Lauren) Harden and with Mangelson. Now we have it in Miles and Mangelson, so it’s nice.”

Both players kept up the strong hitting as HSE neared the finish line, and Mangelson smacked another kill on match point to get the sweep. The Royals were

3-for-3 on set points in the match.

Mangelson totaled 15 kills for Southeastern. Last year she was the junior among an incredibly talented senior class; now she is the senior among a group of

talented juniors.

“She’s handled it with ease,” said Young. “She’s been such a big part of the success of this program over the last three years.” The coach said Mangelson “takes a lot of ownership” of

the program and described her this season as “very calm” and “business-like.”

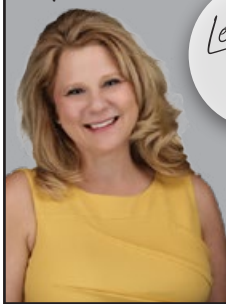

Royals, Millers set to clash for Sectional 8 title

NOBLESVILLE – Here we go again. For the fifth time since 2016, the top-ranked Class 3A Hamilton Southeastern Royals and the No. 2 Noblesville Millers will meet in the sectional finals. For the ninth straight postseason, the defending state champion Millers (14-0-2) will seek to end the No. 1 nationally ranked Royals (15-0-3) IHSAA state tournament hopes. With the Sectional 8 finals set for 2 p.m. this Saturday at the Noblesville Hallmark Orthodontics Soccer Complex, both Hoosier Crossroads Conference programs took care of the business during Thursday night's semifinal round to usher in the ninth consecutive in-season rematch. In the first semifinal game on Thursday, Noblesville defeated No. 16 Mt. Vernon 5-1 with five different players recording at least one goal. Hamilton Southeastern defeated Pendleton Heights 4-0 after winning the regular-season meeting 6-0 on Sept. 23. "We want to continue to put our best foot forward and play our game. I feel like we're peaking at the right time. I love how this team is playing, and we have a lot of confidence in this team," HSE head coach Greg Davidson said. "Their intensity and level of play no matter what defensive scheme that we saw was good. I'm proud of the girls. They didn't change how they wanted to play, which I think is key going into a sectional championship." The Royals built a 2-0 lead over the Arabians (8-9-1) with goals scored from Kaylan Hoener assisted by Blair Satterfield in the 10th minute before Sloane May found Kate Noel for her first of two goals in the 32nd minute. Noel's second goal off a corner-kick assist by Jacqueline Lance in the 57th minute made it 3-0, followed by a Gracie Pyle assist to May for her 10th goal on the season

in the 69th minute. Prior to their shutout of Pendleton Heights, the Royals blanked No. 18 Fishers 5-0 to reach the sectional finals where they'll face Noblesville for the first time since 2020 with everything on the line. The teams battled to a 1-1 draw on Aug. 31 on the same pitch. The Millers led 1-0 off an Atley Pittman free-kick goal in the 71st minute before HSE scored the equalizer in the 77th minute. "There won't be (a tie). We've had a couple of games where we were like, 'Man, like to get that tie back,' so here's another opportunity," Davidson said. "You've got the two best teams in the state, and the only two teams that have been unbeaten, so it's a huge game for both programs." However, while Noblesville is ranked third nationally behind HSE, Davidson doesn't feel his Royals are the favorite. Not with the Millers winning back-to-back state titles and four of the last five in 3A. "Noblesville has the weight of the world. They're the defending state champions. They're very good, and they're unbeaten. We're very good, and we really like our team," Davidson said. The Millers led Mt. Vernon 3-0 by halftime and added two more goals in the second half. Pittman put the Millers in front off a Meredith Tippner assist in the eighth minute before Lily Ault made it 2-0 in the 13th minute off an assist by Pittman. Kendall Kramer's first-career goal in the 26th minute made it a 3-0 advantage. "I saw an open shot, and it was great. I did not expect it. I really didn't mean to take a shot, but I did. I meant to just put it over the top," Kramer said. "It feels amazing. It made my night, for sure." Tippner tallied her 19th goal of the season in the 44th minute and Delaney Stone buried a goal in the 46th minute before Mt. Vernon erased the shutout bid late.

“The ultimate goal is just to play another game. Again, we should have beaten this team tonight, but you never know. I think we came out with the energy to play our game, but we’re going to have to be better in 36 hours because that’s a really good Hamilton Southeastern team,” Millers head coach Mike Brady said.

“The team I have is totally committed to that end goal, and the goal has to be a state title, but we know we can’t look past anyone. We didn’t look past Mt. Vernon tonight, and there’s no way you can look past HSE. Again, nothing is for certain.”

History favors the Millers, however.

In 2020, the teams tied 0-0 in the regular season before the Millers won 2-1 in the sectional finals. In 2019, Noblesville won 2-1 in conference play and 3-1 in the sectional title game. In 2017, a 3-2 regular-season win led to a 1-0 finals victory. In 2016, Noblesville swept the series 3-2 and 1-0

in the finals.

HSE beat Noblesville 3-2 in the regular season in 2023 for the first time since 2014 but hasn’t won against its top foe in the playoffs during that time frame.

“That’s the battle between our two clubs and being in the same conference, being in the same sectional. It’s a great thing to be a part of,” Tippner said. “Again, the fans, the communities want to see great soccer being played, and we get to see them earlier in the season, and we often find them again later in the season.”

In the past three postseason meetings, the Millers have prevailed twice in the semifinals and once in the quarterfinals by margins of one goal.

“Often the effort you put in and the little things you get better at are a lot of times the difference in those big games,” Tippner said. “We feel confident in ourselves, and again, you have to go out and put on a performance in order to go on to regional.”

We’re now at the point that two regular season games remain, and the high school football season has obviously flown by. And teams are that much closer to finding out their postseason fates, as the sectional draw for the IHSAA football state tournament takes place at 6 p.m. Sunday on ihsaatv.org.

Early next week, The Reporter will have a breakdown of the matchups for all eight Hamilton County teams and who they will face in their respective classes to begin the state football tournament.

6A No. 8 Hamilton Southeastern (5-2, 3-2) at 6A No. 12 Franklin Central (4-2, 3-2)

The Royals and Flashes will meet for the seventh time since Franklin Central joined the Hoosier Crossroads Conference. HSE holds a 4-2 record in the first six and has won four in a row after dropping the first two in the series.

Franklin Central took down Fishers at home last week, 22-13.

Noblesville came up on the short end of a back-and-forth battle at home to Hamilton Southeastern. The two HCC rivals traded touchdowns throughout with HSE winning late, 28-21.

Brody Gump got the Millers on the board on the first play of the game with an 80-yard touchdown run, 7-0.

A few minutes later, Kendrick Pennybaker caught a 23-yard pass from Chandler Weston to tie it

7-7.

Noblesville grabbed a 14-7 lead at half on a Ty Holmes two-yard TD run with 58 seconds left in the second.

The Royals tied it 14-14 midway through the third on a Carter Reed run from two yards away.

The fourth became the survival of the fittest. On the first play of the quarter, Vaughan Johnson put HSE out in front 21-14 with a 19-yard run.

The Millers tied it again 21-21 with Holmes’ second touchdown run. Southeastern then stunned the home crowd when Johnson ran in his second score with six seconds left to give the Royals the 28-21 road win.

Reed led the rushing attack for HSE with 156 yards on 21 carries and Johnson was a solid complement with 93 on 11 rushes.

Eastern (Greentown) (3-4, 3-2) at Sheridan (4-3, 4-1)

The Comets and Blackhawks will meet up for the 12th time at Bud Wright Stadium tonight. Sheridan has an 8-3 record so far in the series, although Eastern has won three of the last five, including last year’s 19-14 win on their home field.

Eastern got its second win in a row last week over Tri-Central, 28-6.

The Blackhawks stood the tall task on the road at Delphi last week and came home with a 21-7 victory.

Delphi grabbed a 7-0 first quarter lead and the score stayed the same at halftime.

The Indians tied it 6-6 with a second quarter score, which was the halftime total.

Twin Lakes grabbed the lead 13-6 with a touchdown. Heights jumped back in front 14-13 on a second touchdown pass from Sigler to Champion.

The Indians kicked a field goal at the beginning of the fourth for a 16-14 edge, but that didn’t last long.

Luke Davis ran back a short interception 10-yards for the 20-16 lead that the Huskies never gave back.

In the final minute Sigler completed the hat trick to Champion for a five-yard TD.

Sigler was 14 of 23 for 237 yards through the air, mainly to Champion for 222 yards on 10 receptions. Along with Davis, Nick Bichey also had an interception.
